10.00	Navigating the complexities of planning permissions in today's volatile economic landscape requires strategic foresight and legal acumen. Drawing on Nicholle's extensive experience with large-scale regeneration projects and 25 years of planning advisory work, this paper examines critical considerations for securing deliverable planning consents. The paper will examine strategies for obtaining robust permissions, both outline and detailed, and address the nuances of multi-phased and cross-jurisdictional developments.
